



Head of Section/Research Group/PIs

School/Institute Health and Safety Committee, Safety Adviser

Individual Workers

Individual responsibilities:

- Familiarity with relevant parts of University Health and Safety Policy
- Clear understanding of School/area Health and Safety documents and systems
- Potentially hazardous work covered by Risk Assessments

School/Area Safety Committee members:

- Representation from all staff and student categories
- Good understanding of / involvement in formulation of relevant Risk Assessments
- Promotion of positive "safety culture"



School/Area Self-inspection

- Requirement of University H & S Policy
- Formal records of inspections kept
- Small "manageable" areas, perhaps on more regular, less formal basis
- Swapping of areas other SSAs?
- No School/area full-time health and safety professionals help from H&S Department?



Health and Safety Management and Compliance Audits

- Programme set up in response to "high profile" incidents.
- Change in emphasis from loss control surveys of premises.
 - Intended to reveal areas of weakness in the management of Health and Safety at Edinburgh University

- Health and Safety Management Implementation Audits
- Compliance Auditing
 - Compliance with policy, procedures, etc.



Health and Safety Managementand Compliance Audits

Next phases of Aon audit programme

- Audits of University's new or refurbished buildings
- Health and Safety Management at School level and below



Topic based audits

- In consultation with expert agencies from outside University
- Liquid Nitrogen facilities
- High hazard substances
- Programme to be expanded to ensure full compliance with legislation

Carried out by Health and Safety Department

- Annual School Health and Safety Report
- Annual Accident, Disease and Incident Survey
- Occupational Health Unit Annual Report
- Annual Retrospective Report of Activities involving Genetic Modification

Annual School Health and Safety Report

- Requirement from University Court
- Comes from Head of School, goes to Secretary of University
- Covers all main areas of legislation concerning University
- Information on all questions in Report collated into statistical data

Annual Accident, Disease and Incident Survey

- Legal requirement
- Local Remedial action
- University wide / national view
- Classification into types of accident
- Comparison with other similar institutions

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Report of an Accident, Dangerous Occurrence or Incident.



- Comprehensive annual report, detailing successful compliance with legislation, and records and statistics on accidents, incidents and cases of occupational ill-health
- Report submitted to University Health and Safety Committee
- Summary to University Court
