Disability, Gender, Race, Sexual Orientation

The procedure sets out how the University should carry out a case review in the event of an unexpected student death, in order to generate learning that might improve support for students in future. As such while it is not expected to disadvantage any particular group, it is likely to particularly benefit students of any background who have mental health conditions, though it may also benefit those with other serious health conditions or disabilities. We know that suicides are a leading cause of death for young men in Scotland, therefore the procedure may be of additional relevance to them. We also know that levels of disadvantage in some BAME communities are linked to increased prevalence of mental health issues, for example suicide rates among Black ad Black African young men are higher (at UK level) than for their British White counterparts, therefore the procedure may indirectly be of relevance to some BAME groups. We also know there is above average prevalence of mental health issues among the LGBT+ community, and therefore the procedure may be of additional relevance to them.

Where a case review identifies improvements to support for students, the procedure will contribute to advancing equality of opportunity (by ensuring better support for at risk groups or individuals) as well as fostering good relations where the review itself, or associated training and improvements, contributes to greater understanding of the needs of at-risk groups or individuals across the wider University community.
